WELCOME TO MNFF11! WE'RE SO GLAD YOU'RE HERE.

Whether you are arriving with a meticulously highlighted schedule or you're just hoping to stumble into something great (spoiler: you will), we're thrilled to welcome you to the 11th Annual Middlebury New Filmmakers Festival. We are excited to again bring you five days of film programming that celebrates the work of first- and second-time directors and producers; more than a dozen panels and talks meant to engage and surprise you; and a delightful smattering of parties and social events that will connect you to your fellow film lovers.

This year's festival offers more than 100 films across eight screens throughout downtown Middlebury and the Middlebury College campus. Within this program you'll find comedies to entertain you. You'll find documentaries to challenge and inspire you. You'll find brave new student work. You'll find curated collections of shorts from across the world. And you'll find our dynamic Vermont Collection, featuring films told by and about those who call Vermont home. More than 60 filmmaking teams will join us in person. And nearly two-thirds of our screenings include a live, on-stage Q&A. As you thumb through these pages, we hope you find more than you can ever hope to attend: a bounty of films and talks that are variously thought-provoking, funny, complicated, introspective and playful.

As our programming team shaped this year's schedule of films, talks and special guests, two themes emerged: journalism and comedy. One theme examines how the serious work of news reporting can shape our understanding of reality, power and identity. The other reminds us that humor can be a surprisingly deft tool for social commentary, slipping insights past our defenses, one laugh at a time. Both themes ask us to interrogate the role of stories in our lives: their potential for both truth-telling and artifice, their ability to both connect and divide.


We think our Opening Night and Closing Night films reflect these dual themes as well. On Opening Night, we'll feature *Prime Minister*, the intimate and unflinching documentary that goes behind the scenes of New Zealand's former Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern's political career.

On Sunday, to close us out, we'll show *The Ballad of Wallis Island*, a narrative feature comedy that tells the story of former bandmates—and former lovers—who reunite for a private show at the island home of an eccentric millionaire. (Complications ensue.)

Beyond our films, we are also honored to welcome a rich roster of special guests and honorees. Special guests include US Congresswoman Becca Balint, actor Peter Sarsgaard, comedian Tina Friml, Vermont Poet Laureate Bianca Stone, *Daily Show* writer Devin Delliquanti and novelist Melanie Finn, among others. And our five MNFF11 honorees include director Allan Nicholls, director Rodney Evans, actor Gary Farmer, film scholar Scott MacDonald and *The New York Times* Chief White House Correspondent David E. Sanger. Most will appear in panels and conversations that are free and open to the public, as well as in special post-film Q&As that invite viewer participation.

While we are proud of our program this year, we are also deeply aware that a film festival is not merely a line-up of offerings. A festival is also an exchange between maker and viewer, between storyteller and audience. That's where you come in. As our tagline promises: Stories Begin Here. But we think they won't end here. We think you'll question them, debate them, laugh about them, talk about them with your wider circle of friends and family and let them shape your understanding of the world.

We hope you do.





HOW TO FEST

WE'VE GONE DIGITAL!

IMPORTANT NOTES ON PASSES, TICKETS AND BOX OFFICE

We're excited to streamline our ticketing process for MNFF in 2025! In that effort, we've gone digital with all of our advance pass and ticket purchasing this year.

Ifyou're buying a pass or individual tickets to MNFF11, we highly encourage you to do so online, before the festival begins, at **middfilmfest.org**. Purchasing passes and tickets in advance guarantees you a seat to the screenings of your choice (provided you arrive on time). And it helps our staff and volunteer crew as we strive to make venue entry quick and efficient, and to make sure we have extra staff at popular or sell-out screenings. Plus: our online ticketing system enables us to collect and tally Audience Award votes more accurately and speedily!

Unlike previous years, we will not be selling passes or tickets to the festival in person prior to the festival dates, nor will individual tickets be available in person at our individual screening venues during the festival. **Instead, we encourage you to make all of your pass and ticket purchases online with a credit card.**

If you'd like to purchase a pass or ticket once the festival begins on August 20, you can still do so online, at any time—even minutes before a screening begins, if you'd like. Beginning August 20, you can also purchase passes and tickets in person at our Festival Box Office in the new wing of the Town Hall Theater. The Festival Box Office will be open daily from Wednesday, August 20-Sunday, August 24, 2025. At the Festival Box Office, we can accept cash or card payments, and we'll have staff and volunteers on site to help, too.



FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

GENERAL

THIS IS MY FIRST FILM FESTIVAL! IS IT JUST LIKE GOING TO SEE ANY OTHER MOVIE?

Well, yes and no! It will feel pretty similar from when the lights dim until the credits roll, but film festivals offer a lot of opportunities that "regular" movie screenings don't.

The main difference is that Middlebury New Filmmakers Festival offers you exclusive access to emerging voices in film, and many of the films in our program are Vermont, New England and even world premieres. And beyond discovering films that you can't see anywhere else, in many cases you'll get the chance to hear from the filmmakers directly, mingle with them at parties and ask them questions about their work and inspiration.

WHEN SHOULD I ARRIVE AT EACH SCREENING?

We ask that you arrive at each screening 15 minutes in advance. Please note that even if you've secured a ticket online, your seat cannot be guaranteed if you do not arrive 15 minutes prior to showtime.

WHAT WILL HAPPEN IF I SHOW UP LATE?

Our volunteers might throw you in the fountain!

Just kidding. Life happens, and if you're running late, it's still possible that you'll be able to see the film. But you'll be directed to the back of the line, which means that you might not get a seat if you're attending a particularly popular screening. In short, always aim to show up minutes early.

ARE THE FILMS FAMILY FRIENDLY?

Sometimes. We have a special "For All Ages" tag on our schedule that denotes which films are suitable for a younger audience. In general, we encourage parents to look over the film descriptions/ trailers and use their own discretion when choosing which films are appropriate for the whole family.

PASSES & TICKETS

WHEN I LOOK AT THE FILMS AND SCHEDULE, I KEEP SEEING THE NAME EVENTIVE. WHAT'S THAT?

Eventive is our new online festival platform and ticketing system. We are using Eventive to streamline the process for our staff, festivalgoers and box office managers.

DO I HAVE TO MAKE AN ACCOUNT ON EVENTIVE?

When you purchase your first pass or ticket online, Eventive will ask you to create an account in order to buy passes/tickets, and from then on you will always have an account with us.

HOW DO I PURCHASE A VERMONTER OR STUDENT PASS?

If you're a Vermonter or a student, you can purchase the relevant pass at **middfilmfest.org**. When you claim your passes, make sure to bring your valid Vermont state/student identification to pick them up at the box office!

I'M ON A BUDGET/NOT PLANNING TO STAY FOR THE WHOLE FESTIVAL. ARE THERE OPTIONS FOR ME?

Yes! Your first option is a Day Pass, which costs \$50 and gets you into all film screenings and panels for that specific day. For instance, you might consider grabbing a Day One (Thursday) pass if you know you'll be busy for the rest of the festival.

We also offer tickets to individual screenings, which go for \$17 per screening. If you are only looking to go to a few films across the festival dates, this might be the perfect option! Or maybe you have a pass and want to purchase a standalone ticket for a friend. Just make sure to note that individual tickets will not grant you access to parties or our Friday night happy hour.

WILL I GET A PHYSICAL PASS AND LANYARD THIS YEAR? WHERE DO I PICK IT UP?

Yep! After you order your pass online, you will have a physical pass available for pickup at our Festival Box Office in Town Hall Theater's new wing.

Once you've picked up your physical pass, we encourage you to wear your pass proudly! It will get you quicker entry into screenings and parties, and it will also help our staff and volunteers to easily identify passholders. Plus, it will signal to everyone else that you have excellent taste!

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

IF I PURCHASED A FESTIVAL PASS, DOES THAT MEAN I CAN AUTOMATICALLY GET INTO EVERY SCREENING?

Not necessarily. We highly encourage you to reserve tickets to specific screenings in advance, to save your seat.

Browse the whole schedule at **middfilmfest.org**, select the films you're interested in attending and click on Get Tickets to add a specific film screening ticket to your pass. If you are a passholder, all tickets will be free to reserve and forever linked to your pass, which will guarantee you access to a seat in the theater (provided that you arrive 15 minutes prior to showtime!)

Whether you reserve a ticket in advance or not, please note that if you do not arrive 15 minutes prior to showtime, your seat cannot be guaranteed. At 15 minutes prior to showtime, we will let in passholders with reserved tickets first, then individual ticketholders and then passholders without reserved tickets. At showtime, any remaining seats in the theater may be given to those who have not purchased tickets in advance.

WHAT HAPPENS IF I LOSE MY PHYSICAL PASS?

Not to fear! If you lose your pass and time is of the essence, your email confirmation (on your phone or printed out) can serve as a backup for entry to screening venues for films to which you've purchased a ticket. This will work in a pinch.

If you've lost your pass and you aren't in a rush, you can bring your email confirmation back to our Festival Box Office and ask that we print a replacement pass for you.

That said, our team is small and largely volunteer powered, so please do your best to keep your pass safe.

WAIT, IF I HAVE A PASS CONFIRMATION EMAILED TO ME, DO I EVEN NEED TO PICK UP MY PHYSICAL PASS?

Yes, we ask that you pick up your physical pass and wear it throughout the festival. This helps our festival volunteers and venue managers quickly identify you as a passholder, scan you into each venue with speed and manage lines and crowds at each venue.

Plus, while an email confirmation can be used if you have a pass emergency, we don't want you to have to rely on your phone or a printed piece of paper. Phone batteries can die; passes are forever!

WHAT'S THE DEAL WITH OPENING NIGHT?

As of press time, this event is sold out.

If you have a ticket to this event, note that your ticketed seat will be held for you until showtime on August 20 at 6pm, after which point we may offer your seat to someone on the waitlist. You may print a physical copy of your ticket to bring to Opening Night, or show the pdf of your ticket at the door; just remember to bring your smartphone fully charged! Even if you're a passholder, you must have a separate Opening Night ticket to attend this event.

IS THERE ASSIGNED SEATING FOR SCREENINGS?

All seating is general admission, first-come first-served. At 15 minutes prior to showtime, we will let in passholders with reserved tickets first, then individual ticketholders, and then passholders without reserved tickets. If you want a prime seat, reserve your ticket in advance and show up early!

WHAT IS YOUR PASS AND TICKET RETURN AND REFUND POLICY?

All passes and tickets are non-refundable. All sales are final. If you have any questions or concerns about a purchase, please feel free to reach out to **tickets@middfilmfest.org**.

TRAVEL, PARKING & ACCESSIBILITY

IS THE FESTIVAL WALKABLE?

Extremely! All of our screenings and events take place within a 20-minute walk from each other; some venues are only a few minutes away from each other. And Middlebury is a small and very walkable town in general.

ARE YOUR VENUES ACCESSIBLE?

The short answer is yes, but please find detailed information about the specific accessibility features of each screening venue by visiting **middfilmfest.org/festival**. If you have any further questions, please feel free to reach out to **accessibility@middfilmfest.org**.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

WHERE CAN I PARK?

There are many free, walkable places to park around Middlebury, but some lots are tucked away behind buildings or around corners. Here is a map that will help you find them.



SCAN FOR A PARKING MAP

Here are our recommended spots for parking for each festival venue. Note that all parking lots are walkable and convenient to key festival venues, but you should allow ten minutes between parking and arriving at your venue, just in case.

Town Hall Theater: Merchants Row, North Pleasant Street or after business hours, the Langrock, Sperry & Wool Law Firm (111 South Pleasant Street) or the Foote Law Firm (135 South Pleasant Street).

Middlebury Marquis Theatre: Mill Street Lot, Lower Library Lot or the Frog Hollow Lot.

Dana Auditorium: Street parking on College St/Route 125, St. Mary's Church Lot (except Sunday) or the Atwater Lot.

Twilight Hall: Academy Street Lot.

Axinn Center at Starr Library (Axinn 232): Street parking on Route 30, or the Mahaney Arts Center Lot.

Crooked Ladle: Mill Street Lot, Lower Library Lot or the Frog Hollow Lot.

Edgewater Gallery: Merchants Row, Mill Street Lot, Lower Library Lot or the Frog Hollow Lot.



HONOREES



ALLAN NICHOLLS is a Canadian actor, director, producer, screenwriter, composer and musician. Often performing multiple roles for a film, Nicholls has worked on Oscar-nominated *Dead Man Walking* (1995) and *The Player* (1992), the Palme d'Or-nominated *Cradle Will Rock* (1999) and the Golden Globe-nominated

Bob Roberts (1992). He also co-wrote screenplays A Perfect Couple (1979) and the BAFTA-nominated A Wedding (1978), both directed by Robert Altman, and wrote and directed the film Dead Ringer (1981) starring Meat Loaf.



RODNEY EVANS is a fiction and documentary filmmaker. His feature documentary, *Vision Portraits*, had its World Premiere at the SXSW Film Festival and played theatrically in major US cities to universal acclaim. His debut fiction feature, *Brother To Brother*, won the Sundance Special Jury Prize, and garnered four Indepen-

dent Spirit Award Nominations including Best Debut Performance for Anthony Mackie. His latest short, *Portal*, is currently streaming as part of Black Public Media's AfroPop Digital Shorts series. Evans was a 2020 Sundance Momentum Fellow, a 2021 Ford/Mellon Disabilities Futures Fellow and an NEH/Firelight Media Spark Fund Awardee for 2022-23.



GARY FARMER is an actor, artist, musician and activist who has been celebrated throughout his career for carving out space for Indigenous voices in cinema and beyond. He may be best known for his roles in cult classics like *Powwow Highway* (1989), *Dead Man* (1995) and *Smoke Signals* (1998), as well as his portrayal of the

eccentric Uncle Brownie on FX's Emmy-nominated *Reservation Dogs*. Farmer also chairs the Santa Fe International Film Festival, where he created and curates the annual Indigenous Film Program.



SCOTT MACDONALD is author of *A Critical Cinema: Interviews with Independent Filmmakers* (5 volumes, California), *The Garden in the Machine* (California, 2001) and 14 other books, most recently *Avant-Doc: Intersections of Documentary* and *Avant-Garde Cinema (Oxford, 2015) The Sublimity of Document: Cinema as Diorama*

(Avant-Doc 2) (Oxford, 2019); William Greaves: Filmmaking as Mission (Columbia, 2020); and most recently, Publication as Autobiography (Sticking Place, 2024) and Comprehending Cinema (Oxford, 2024). Named an Academy Scholar by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts & Sciences in 2011, he has taught film history at Utica College, Bard College, Colgate University and Harvard University and currently teaches and programs F.I.L.M. at Hamilton College.



DAVID E. SANGER is the White House and National Security Correspondent for *The New York Times*, reporting on President Trump and his administration, with a particular focus on foreign policy and its intersection with technology, politics and superpower conflict. He has been a member of three teams that won the

Pulitzer Prize and has been awarded numerous honors for national security and foreign policy coverage.
